OVERALL OBJECTIVES:

- Demonstrate an understanding of the basic pharmacologic properties of opioids and how these properties relate to safe and effective use of drugs for pain management in advanced illness.
- Identify the clinical scenarios associated with addiction and/or accidental death due to drug poisoning.
- Review the indications for the use of radiation oncology and pain management.
- Compare and contrast various assessment approaches to pain management.

PRESENTATIONS

Responsible Opioid Prescribing - Scott Fishman, MD Univ. of CA - Davis, Sacramento, CA

It is important to prescribers to increase their awareness of the most recent trends and tenants of handling controlled substances for individuals with pain. Risk management is taking a more prominent place in the overall scheme of care. In this session, participants will gain further insight into the risk management aspect of these medications. An individual's functional outcome will be discussed as it relates to pain relief versus addiction.

Michigan Pain Management Program Update: Survey Findings and Accomplishments – Steve Creamer, MA - MDCH Bureau of Hlth. Professions - Lansing, MI

Mr. Creamer will provide a brief history and program update of the State of Michigan Pain Management & Palliative Care Program. A review of 2010 strategies used by the program to improve pain management in Michigan will be discussed. The findings from the 2009 and 2010 pain management survey of Michigan physicians will be presented, as well as an analysis of findings from the 2009 pain management survey of the public. Future strategies of the program will be briefly identified.

Is There Proper Stimulant Use for Opiate Patients? – William Morrone, DO - Synergy Medical Edu Alliance - Bay City, MI

This lecture will provide health care providers with an interactive education activity to address the benefits and risks of Opioid therapy, assessment strategies, abuse deterrent technologies, and required documentation for compliance of regulatory policies in order to address challenges related to increase in prescription drug abuse and the undertreatment of pain.

Radiation Oncology in Pain Management and Palliative Care – David Howell, MD - UofM Medical School - Mt. Pleasant, MI

60% of patients diagnosed with cancer in the US will require radiation therapy during the course of their disease. Of these patients, 40% will require radiation therapy to palliate symptoms of their disease. During this review, the participant can expect to learn the fundamentals of how radiation works, indications for palliative radiation and radiation oncology referral, as well as the basis of planning and delivery of radiation. Clinical indications for palliative radiation will be reviewed, including bone and brain metastases, spinal cord/canal compression, and the use of radiation for relieving symptoms of malignant pain, obstruction, pressure and bleeding.

Issues on the delivery and reimbursement for radiation while a patient may be on the hospice benefit will also be reviewed, as will the indications for single treatment vs. multiple treatment radiation courses.

Addiction/Accidental Death due to Drug Poisoning – William Morrone, DO Synergy Medical Edu Alliance - Bay City, MI

To provide a brief overview of the risk of addiction and death due to pain medication abuse/misuse.

Opioid Prescribing – Phillip Rodgers, MD - UofM Palliative Care Program - Ann Arbor, MI

This interactive, case-based session will focus on current evidence-based guidelines for safe and effective Opioid analgesic prescribing, including strategies for patient selection, medication initiation and titration, follow-up and monitoring. Special attention will be paid to newer Opioid medications and preparations, challenging patients, and evolving regulatory issues.

State of Michigan Current and Future Efforts to Address Pain Management – Susan Affholter, MPH & Mike Wissel, RPh, MDCH Pain Mgmt. & Palliative Care - Lansing, MI

The participants will learn about several State of Michigan programs that address pain and symptom management:

1. Pain Management and Palliative Care Program
2. Pharmacy Program / Michigan Automated Prescription System (MAPS)
3. Health Professional Recovery Program (HPRP)
4. Bureau of Substance Abuse and Addiction Services
5. (BSAAS); Arthritis' Personal Action Toward Health (P.A.T.H.) Program
6. Cancer Prevention and Control Program / Michigan Cancer Consortium efforts related to improving cancer survivorship pain and symptom issues

War on Pain – Scott Fishman, MD Univ. of CA - Davis, Sacramento, CA

This session will provide participants with lively discourse on how to differentiate pain from addiction. It is important to understand how pain is a multi-layered symptom, that is best cared for as an interdisciplinary model.
